Roger gave a fascinating presentation about the history and significance of sticks and staffs. From the wielding of power to defence and weapons, it made a thought-provoking talk. We saw pictures of Egyptian pharaohs, kings and gentry holding 'sticks' as symbols of power: one small person of power felt the need for two very long staffs! Lower classes then copied the notion of carrying sticks, but not in the presence of the ruler. Roger pointed out the significance of a long ferrule on the bottom of a stick - to cope with the muddy streets in days gone by - a sign of an old stick. We also learned about sticks designed to conceal weapons and illicit alcohol. It will certainly make me look harder at old paintings and rituals involving sticks of any kind in future.
