Lesley whose entry was only the second carving she had ever done. We finished up the afternoon with a



Sat 29th Aug. Our Annual Woodcarving Exhibition, St Thomas Church Hall, Lymington. Set up Friday 28th 5-6pm. Saturday final set up from 8am, open 10-4.
