As usual we dished out voting slips so that visitors could nominate their favourite carving in the exhibition and of the 63 votes we received the outright winner this year was Maggie's hare. Out of interest, other carvings that got votes were Paul's tall brown abstract and satchel, Ces's lily pad, Di's octopus, grebes, breaching whale and tree frog, a lot of Allan's incredibly detailed carvings (too many to list), Mary's owl, Andy's sharks and trout, Dorothy's gloves, Pippa's wren, dormouse nest, nativity, menagerie and bat, several of Maggie's birds and a carving of a man with his dog by Mike Passfield.

Thanks to everyone who contributed to make it such an attractive exhibition. We had a lot of positive comments and several people who expressed an interest in joining us in the new term.







SEPTEMBER SOCIAL

Graham Limburn is the man in charge of Oaklands Woodcarving Club in Lordshill to which a number of us go on a Monday night and he kindly agreed to come along to our September social meeting to talk about his other passion which is leatherwork.

We were told about the process of tanning in both ancient and modern times and in days gone by it was a particularly disgusting process with an accompanying awful smell hence tanneries tended to be situated away from centres of population. But the finished product is a wonderful material and in the hands of people like Graham it can be transformed into many types of beautiful objects. Most of the leather items that we come across in everyday life are simply coloured or embossed but Graham takes it to the next level by tooling the leather so that he comes up with pieces that have the appearance of being carved which is essentially what it is and no doubt his woodcarving experience has helped him in this.

We saw book covers, purses, containers, water bottles and even a chessboard but the star of the show was the tunic/breastplate which you can see in the picture below, the main body of which had been moulded over a mannequin before being embellished with elaborate designs and multiple buckles.
