YANDLES VISIT

On Saturday 7th October we arranged a minibus trip down to Yandles Sawmills in Martock. Some of you may remember visiting Yandles in bygone years when they used to have a big trade fair event in spring and autumn. Those events were discontinued a few years ago but recently they advertised the presence of a couple of companies on this particular date so we thought it would be a good time to pay a visit.



Fifteen of us turned up on a sunny morning at Oak Road car park in Purlieu and boarded the bus for the two hour journey to Somerset and when we got there we were joined by Dot, Mary and Yvonne who had gone under their own steam, and a little later by Chris and Sharon Challis.

On arrival it's fair to say that it wasn't exactly bustling and the only difference from a normal day was the presence of a Charnwood representative to answer technical questions. No matter,



we were not jostling for space in the wood shed, we were able to take things at our own pace and we also enjoyed a 10% discount on timber. Everyone seemed to be looking at everything and buying something and there were even a couple of trolleys being pushed round in the wood shed so some were doing some serious stocking up.

Of course Yandles isn't just about wood. Some of our members were very interested in the craft section and spent quite some time in there and there was a very nice café where most of us took the opportunity of tea and cake. Hopefully, at the end of the three hours we all got the material we wanted and the inspiration to do something with it.



BURN AT THE BARN

At the summer exhibition Maggie Port gave a demonstration of pyrography showing our visitors how she uses burning techniques to achieve the wonderful feather effects on her bird carvings. This has also generated a lot of interest among our own members and so Maggie suggested that she could give a tutorial to anyone who was keen to learn more.

After some discussion the date decided on was Saturday 18th November when Mary Manston very kindly offered the use of one of her barns to house the event and interest was such that it had to be divided into two sessions with half a dozen in the morning and another half dozen in the afternoon.

Most people had their own machines and we all had light coloured wood or ply on which to practice. Maggie provided photographs of a number of different subjects like birds, cats or small animals together with tracing paper and soon we had a design marked on our wood ready for burning.

Of course we had a number of different types of machine and there was a lot of discussion, experimentation and a few burnt fingers while we figured out the intricacies of each one but after a while we were good to go. Then under Maggie's expert guidance we were able to start producing the effects that we wanted. There was a lot of chat but also periods of complete silence as the

concentration took over and all too soon the two and a half hours was gone and we took the opportunity to

sit back and inspect our own and each other's work.

I'm sure I'm not alone in seeing that pyrography will be a useful addition to my woodcarving skills and so a big thank you to Maggie for her expertise, Mary for the use of the barn and Kaili and Debbie for the cakes. Who knows? – this could be something we do again in the future.

On the other hand, the French eat a lot of fat and also suffer fewer heart attacks than the British or Americans.


The Japanese drink very little red wine and suffer fewer heart attacks than the British or Americans


