VISIT TO PONDHEAD INCLOSURE



On Saturday 1st
November, following
the visit of Dave Dibden
in September to give us
a talk about his work at
Pondhead Inclosure near
Lyndhurst, we took him
up on his kind offer to
give us a guided walk
around the area.

It was a lovely sunny morning with just the

threat of a few showers when fourteen of us turned up bright and early in the car park of the Crown & Stirrup pub on the Brockenhurst road just outside the village and met up with Dave and his two terriers. And so off we went, fifteen people and six dogs through the pub garden and into the inclosure.

As we wandered along, Dave made frequent stops to explain how the Pondhead Conservation Trust which is made up entirely of volunteers, have made big changes to the area over the last decade or so. The area has not been grazed for centuries meaning it has very different trees and plants than the surrounding forest but prior to the formation of the Trust, had become neglected and overgrown. So, over time, the volunteers have used old maps to identify the tracks and cleared them making t hem accessible to everyone. They have also brought the old hazel coppices back into use to provide material for all sorts of things like wattles and bean poles and also to provide the raw material for charcoal.

And speaking of charcoal, we soon arrived at the production area where we were shown the large steel container where the burning takes place. The various stages were explained including the fact that the gases given off by the process are used to provide fuel to continue



the process meaning that it is a very efficient way of producing that lovely stuff that we all crave when the barbecue season is upon us.

After an hour and a half or so we found ourselves having completed a more or less circular route and were back at the pub garden. Unfortunately, Dave was unable to join us for lunch but we thanked him for all his entertaining knowledge and said goodbye as we went into the Crown & Stirrup for a well-earned bite to eat.
